

Mirror, Mirror: Parents Must Be The Role Model

The first rule when parenting unwanted behavior is to first give yourself a behavior audit. Encouraging good behavior comes by parents modeling and reinforcing positive actions. The reality is children notice more things than we realize and learn by watching those around them. This is something we think a lot about when our kids are little but the same principle holds true as your kids enter adolescence.

Here are some quick tips:

Practice what you preach when it comes to good behavior. Point out positive interactions, especially between adults, such as sharing, communicating effectively, using good manners, and taking turns.

Model how to calm down by taking deep breaths together or drinking a glass of water together, whether it's the child who is frustrated or you.

Use Feelings. Instead of using critical statements that might attack the other person, express your actual feelings by saying, "I am feeling sad/frustrated/angry" rather than "You are driving me crazy."

Catch your child doing the right thing. Avoid giving attention to negative behaviors acknowledging and give praise to your child's positive behavior

Recognize the little things such as small acts of kindness, like saying please and thank you, actively listening, speaking at a lower volume, and sharing. Simple phrases like "Good job doing ____!" or "Thank you for _____!" can go a long way. Reinforce positive behavior and encourage your child to continue making good choices starts with you! By focusing on and reinforcing good behavior, you help your child understand the value of their positive actions.

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Snow Paint a Snowman Craft

This DIY snow paint is SO FUN to paint with, and really easy to make! Mix up a batch of your own puffy snow paint in just a few minutes and use this glimmering and fluffy paint to create your own wintery scenes. This snow paint actually dries puffy without losing its raised texture. And the glitter in the paint makes it look like ice crystals, which makes it even more fun! It's such a cool winter craft, and a great sensory experience that allows kids to create 3D paintings.

Supplies Needed:

- * White Glue
- * Flour
- * Shaving Cream
- * White Glitter
- * Light Blue Cardstock
- * Craft Foam Sheets (Black, Red, Orange and Brown)
- * Paintbrush
- * Fork or Whisk
- * Small Bowl



Directions:

1. To make the snow paint: Pour in 1 part glue into your bowl. (About 1/3 cup.)

Add 1/2 teaspoon flour to the glue. If you're making a bigger batch of snow paint, increase the amount of flour accordingly. Add 2 parts shaving cream (the foamy kind) to the bowl. Since we added 1/3 cup glue, we added about 2/3 cup of shaving foam. We find it too tough and messy to measure out the glue and shaving cream exactly. As long as your proportions are roughly 1 part glue to 2 parts shaving cream, you'll be good. Add a generous amount of

white glitter to the bowl. Use a fork or a whisk to stir the snow paint together.

- 2. To use the snow paint, dip a large paintbrush into the paint, picking some up on the brush.
- 3. Use the blue cardstock to paint your snowman on. Start with the snowman's head, making a circle with the paint. Next paint a larger circle below the head for the snowman's body. Use the brush to smooth out the edges of the circle and adjust the size as needed.
- 4. Use the craft foam sheets to make decorations for the snowman. From the black foam, cut 2 tiny circles for the eyes, 2 larger circles for the buttons, and a top hat. From the red foam, cut out a scarf, and from the orange foam, cut a triangular carrot nose. Finally, from the brown foam, cut out tree branch style arms.
- 5. Decorate the snowman with the cut foam pieces. Anything that goes directly onto the snowman will stick by itself, since the paint has glue in it. For the top hat, glue the hat directly onto the paper, on the top or the side of the snowman's head.
- 6. Paint some more snow on the "ground" below the snowman, and add more dots of snow paint in the sky. Add extra glitter for an extra sparkle.
