

Help Your Preschooler Learn and Grow By Taking Regular Walks

Adults often rack their brains for new ways to nurture their children's learning. Simply add learning to an activity you are probably doing anyway: taking a walk.

Walking helps your preschooler stay physically ft. And while you walk, you can also boost observation, math and communication skills. The key is to make walks interesting and fun.

When walking with your child:

- Count cats or dogs—or anything else you see, Different kinds of cars. Fire hydrants. Swings.
- Search for five things you and your child have never seen before.
- **Identify shapes.** What do you see that is round? Square? Oblong? Rectangle? Triangle?
- **Point out numbers**—on mailboxes, buildings or signs.
- See how many things your child can find of a certain color.
- Look for things that need to be fixed. Overgrown weeds. A pothole. Broken windows or fences.
- **Find things** that make each of you happy. A fluffy dog. A baby in a stroller. A smiling neighbor. A bird. A rabbit.

- **Identify letters** of the alphabet on signs. Or, call out the first letter of things you pass. For example, "M" is for mailbox. "T" is for turtle. "C" is for cat.
- Play a game of I Spy. Look ahead of you and say, "I spy something...(smooth, pink, etc.)." See if your child can locate it. Take turns spying and guessing.
- **Be silly!** Every 20 steps for so, do something for your child to imitate—clap your hands, hop, skip or dance.
- Make a nature bracelet—Tie some sticky tape around your child's wrist with the sticky tape upwards. Now they have a nature bracelet that they can stick pretty flowers to or interesting leaves or anything fun they find on your walk.
- Make a lantern for your night walk!
- **Plant something.** Scatter some wildflower seeds in an empty lot or local park and stroll by all the season to check the progress.
- **Notice things** that have changed since your last walk.

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Handprint Shamrock: St. Patrick's Day Craft

This St. Patrick's Day craft is so simple and your kids will love making their own handprint Shamrock!

Supplies Needed:

- Paper (Legal or a small poster board are best)
- Tape
- Paper Plate
- **Small Paint Brush**
- Green Finger Paint
- Child-sized Hands



Instructions:

- **Step 1:** Pour a small amount of green finger paint onto the paper plate.
- Step 2: Let your child dip his/her palm into the paint OR you can use a brush to paint his/her hand.
- Step 3: Press your child's hand down onto the paper at an angle (middle finger pointed toward the top right corner of the paper)
- Step 4: Lift up and move to the next position -> middle finger pointed toward the next corner.
- Step 5: Do this until you have 4 handprints that resemble a handprint shamrock.
- **Step 6:** Now you can let your child paint or draw a stem at the bottom.
